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

Lucknow, is home to some interesting architectural masterpieces dating back to the 18th and 19th centuries. The magnificent Bara Imambara, is said to have tunnels leading to the cities of Agra and Faizabad. Chota Imambara is another must-visit. Husainabad Clock Tower built in 1881, is the tallest clock tower in India. The tower, along with the Rumi Darwaza and Satkhanda, form an important sightseeing circle. You can get a taste of the authentic food of the city in many high-end restaurants in Lucknow, including our inhouse restaurant at Clarks Awadh, as well as in the bustling food streets of Avadh. At the Chouk, you can also buy some of the best attar. If you love jewellery and trinkets, head to Alambagh Market or Lal Bagh Market for a happy splurge.

Conference Theme:
Sustaining Growth with Equity: Sectoral Growth, Trade and Social Protection in the
21st Century

India is the fastest growing among major economies in recent years and has also undergone massive structural transformation since independence. The country's GDP was \$3.7 trillion (nominal) by end of May 2023 and became the 5th largest economy in the world. India has shown positive signs in some macroeconomic fundamentals such as increase in net FDI, reduction of NPA of the banking sector, increase in gross revenue, and increase in Cap-ex budget to 2.7% where 13.5 crores population escaped from multidimensional poverty index recently. The contribution of country's service sector has reached to 54% of the GVA, whereas the contribution of manufacturing has been increasing to 28% and primary sector's contribution has been declining continuously up to 18% in 2022. The nation is bestowed with G-20 presidency to steer forward the agenda of sustainable development in terms of revival of economic growth, stronger climate action, speeding energy transition, promoting food and nutritional security, building a robust health architecture and digitally inclusive economy.

However, Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS) Report reveals, the labour force participation rate has been declining continuously from 46.2% in 2016-17 to 39.5% in 2022-2023 (including

Covid-19 pandemic years). The unemployment rate has been as high as 6-8% during 2016-17 to 2022-23. Moreover, other major indicators such as inequality, accessibility to education and health facilities, viability for cities and environmental degradation are getting worsened. Macroeconomic fundamentals such as persistent large fiscal deficit, decline of export from 22.8% in 2019-20 to 18.7% in 2020-21, decline of domestic savings and gross fixed capital formation are of significant concern.

It is, therefore, an opportune moment not only to reflect on India's long-term trajectory of growth and development, but also to address the immediate challenges posed by the pandemic, which also could have long-term consequences. These challenges are not the same for all sections of the society. Current evidence shows that inequality has increased as vulnerable section (including women workers) and the informal sector have been hugely affected during Covid pandemic and the recovery has been less than satisfactory.

The 19th Annual Conference of the UPUEA is being held at a time when India is recovering from the Covid pandemic and the economy is showing remarkable resilience and growth despite global slowdown. The economies of Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand are also poised with a major transition. This Annual Conference focuses on assessment of some of the major challenges and sectoral and national goals largely in the context of two important yet diverse states of Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand. An elaboration of the major themes of the conference is given below.











Themes of the Conference

Theme 1: Prospects of Manufacturing and Service Sector Growth in India

The development induced structural transformation reflects that the share of agriculture in GVA and employment will decline, and that of manufacturing will commensurately increase. Only at higher levels of development, the share of the tertiary sector is expected to increase, with the sector eventually becoming dominant both in terms of production and employment. India has bypassed this stage of transition with the share of manufacturing sector in national income remaining more or less constant, whereas construction and services absorbing the declining share of agriculture. The service sector is, by far, the dominant sector in the economy with nearly three-fifth share in national income and a quarter share in total employment (agriculture still continues to be the dominant share in terms of employment).

This presents a particular challenge to India's development paradigm. This is because modern manufacturing sector at earlier stages of development is considered to be more labour intensive than services. Moreover, the slow growth in manufacturing sector also implies that the country is a net importer of manufacture while being a net exporter of services. Indian policy regime has given a high weight to services export (for instance in the software sector), but it has also been extremely focused on accelerating the growth of manufacturing. In the past few years, while the government has opened up the services sector more and more to foreign companies, it has also encouraged manufacturing in India, both by Indian and foreign firms through schemes such as "Make in India" and Production Linked Incentives (PLI). Both Central and State governments have also made a concerted effort to attract foreign ventures in manufacturing as well as services.

Under this theme, the UPUEA invites papers which will address the following:

- 1. The trends in growth of manufacturing and services both at the national, state level and regional, more also to analyse at the level of specific industries and sectors.
- 2. Potential of the manufacturing and service sector in India to generate employment, income, and inclusive growth.
- 3. The growth of organized and unorganized segments of industry and services and, in particular, discuss recent trends in the informal sector.
- The trends in foreign capital inflows in different sectors and regions. 4.
- The role of industrial policies at the national level (such as "Make in India", Atmanirbhar 5. Bharat and PLI), state and regional levels.
- 6. Role of digital transformation and innovation in enhancing the competitiveness and productivity of the manufacturing and service sector in India.
- Challenges and opportunities for the manufacturing and service sector in India in the 7. context of global trade and regional integration.













Theme 2: Role and Impact of Social Protection Programmes (SPP)

"Social Protection" includes public measures taken to prevent contingency-based or chronic deprivation. These measures aim at providing essential services and a minimum level of income to people over a life cycle, thus aiming at children, working-age adults, and the older segment. The Bachelet Committee report of 2009 outlines the several levels of impact of social protection which range from the well-being of individuals to macroeconomic stability and equitable growth. The International Labour Organisation's Recommendation 202 adopted in 2012 calls for the institution of a "Social Protection Floor" in all countries depending upon the specific circumstances of that country. It also outlines the general principles underlying such a Floor.

Social Protection programmes in India include both statutory and rights based programmes, such as Employees' Provident Fund Scheme, the Employees' State Insurance Scheme, the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme formulated under MGNREGA legislated in 2005, and the National Food Security programme under the NFSA passed by the parliament in 2013, as well as non-statutory programmes such as the National Old Age Pension Scheme, the Ayushman Bharat Scheme, Income Support scheme for farmers, pension schemes for the unorganized workers, traders and other groups, and several other schemes launched by Central and State governments from time to time. The scope of these schemes has steadily expanded, particularly in the pandemic and post-pandemic period, raising a debate on the rationale, consequences and the fiscal viability of some of them.

Under this theme, submitted papers can explore the role and impact of any particular set of social protection programmes through case studies or empirical analysis at the sub-state, state or national level. The following specific issues that can be explored in these papers, among others are:

- The extent of challenges in implementation and success of Social Protection Programmes (SPP) (such as MGNREGA, Ayushman Bharat, PDS) and its impact in alleviating poverty and creating sustainable livelihoods.
- The macroeconomic and fiscal consequences of social protection programmes and its 2. effectiveness in creating regional imbalances.
- The impact of SPP to address gender inequalities and empowerment of women and girls 3. in different contexts and stages of life.
- The impact of SPP for enhancing resilience and adaptation to shocks and crises, such as 4. conflict, and climate change.
- The impact of SPP for promoting inclusive growth and decent work opportunities for the 5. poor and marginalized communities.
- The linkages of SPP with other sectors and services, such as health, education, nutrition, 6. and child protection.
- The role of digitalization and the banking sector in implementing various government 7. schemes for financial inclusion (through the JAM trinity).











Theme 3: Emerging Features of Trade and Trade Policy

International trade, particularly net exports, is a major driver of economic growth. During 2002-08, India's exports witnessed a sharp increase with trade-GDP ratio touching 55 %. While trade continues to be important, this ratio was about 46 % in 2021. India's recent trade policy (2015-2020) has been extended in the Covid-19 period. A number of steps have been taken in line with India's policy to promote trade in line with the Make-in-India policy. The policy has called for a number of strategic interventions in relation to trade, tariffs and quantitative restrictions. India has also entered into a number of regional trade agreements including agreements with ASEAN, Japan and Korea, consistent with its look-East policy. It has also entered into free trade agreements with Australia and UAE and is further negotiating agreements with the UK, EU, and Canada. This is being done with the objective of augmenting trade with these countries/zones. Steps taken to promote trade have yielded results in a number of sectors, including pharma, electrical and engineering goods, chemicals, gems and jewelry. However, India balance of trade is negative in commodity trade while being positive in services.

The purpose of this theme is to encourage researchers to submit papers on the following main issues:

- Global scenario in trade, its trends, composition and pattern (sector specific, or across 1. sectors/commodities), the role of MSMEs in trade, regional trade agreements and their implications.
- India's trade policy, balance of payments and exchange rate issues, implications of 2. "Make-in-India" and PLI schemes for India's trade in recent years.
- The possibilities of India's engagement with the emerging trade blocs and regional 3. agreements, such as RCEP, CPTPP, and EU-India FTA, and balance its strategic and economic interests.
- 4. How India can address the trade-related aspects of climate change and digital transformation, such as border carbon adjustment mechanisms and data governance.
- The role of e-commerce to enhance India's trade potential and what are the regulatory 5. and infrastructural issues involved.
- Any other issue related to trade and trade policy. 6.

Theme 4: Growth and its Drivers in Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand

Uttar Pradesh is the most populous state and second largest state in terms the share of GDP of the country (9.2%) after Maharashtra (15.7%) surpassing recently to Tamil Nadu (9.1%). Soon after independence, the per capita income of Uttar Pradesh was close to the national average in 1951-52. However, by the middle of the last decade UP's per capita income was only about 40 % of the national average. The state has now drawn up an ambitious road map by which it is aiming to increase its per capita income to the level of the national average. The Uttar Pradesh government has prepared the roadmap to achieve the 1-trillion dollar economy goal by 2027.













The focus of the growth strategy involves giving a boost to the secondary sector revolving around manufacturing, developing tourism circuits, and making investments in business clusters. In the urban infrastructure sector, there is a plan to develop new townships, waste management systems, and waste compost facilities in major cities. Based on the existing infrastructure and economic environment, the government has identified nine economic clusters across the state. While four of these clusters are in western UP (Gautambuddha Nagar, Bulandshahr, Ghaziabad, Hapur, Meerut, Agra, Aligarh, Mathura, Moradabad and Bareilly), the remaining five are in Lucknow, Kanpur, Unnao, Hardoi, Gorakhpur, Kushinagar, Varanasi, Mirzapur, Jhansi, Chitrakoot and Prayagraj. Further, in order to boost growth and infrastructure, the state has focused on increasing capital expenditure. It is making concerted efforts to make Uttar Pradesh an attractive destination for domestic and foreign capital, and to boost the growth of the MSME sector.

Uttarakhand (formerly known as the Uttaranchal) is located in the northwestern part of the country. The literal meaning of Uttarakhand is the transformation of northern terrain. It is also known as Dev Bhoomi because the entire region is the playground of religious and divine beings. Uttarakhand is located in the foothills of the Himalayan mountain range. The state shares borders with China (Tibet) in the north, Nepal in the east, and inter-state boundaries with Himachal Pradesh in the west and northwest and Uttar Pradesh in the south. Dehradun is the capital of Uttarakhand, it is the largest and winter city in the state. The state is home to more than 175 species of rare medicinal, aromatic & herbal plants. The state holds 11th rank among Indian states in terms of per capita income (nominal) and having nearly 80% literacy rate based on 2011 estimation.

Under this theme, the contributions could focus on the following set of issues on both states:

- 1. Historical and recent trajectories of growth and investment of both states, regional dimensions of growth vis-a-vis other states and the country.
- Uttar Pradesh Surging towards \$1 Trillion Economy. 2.
- Pattern of revenue mobilisation and fiscal expenditure; strategies for mobilisation of 3. investment; role, pattern and trends of capital expenditure; creation of growth related infrastructure for both states.
- Sectoral drivers of growth such as agriculture, services, industry and tourismetc in 4. both states.
- Development of education (primary, secondary and higher) sector in both states. 5.
- Development and role of financial and banking sector, capital market and financial 6. inclusion in both states.
- 7. The role of Self Help Groups (SHGs), its success and challenges for promoting growth of rural economy in both states.
- Role of One District One Product (ODOP) for the UP's GSDP. 8.
- Role of health accessibility to the growth of both states.
- 10. Recent energy transition policies and its prospects for growth of both states.
- 11. Prospects of achieving the target of a trillion dollar economy by 2027 in UP.
- 12. Other relevant issues relating to UP and Uttarakhand's growth.















Theme 5: Environment, Climate Change and Sustainable Development

Climate Change is the greatest problem on the earth as everyone get affected by it and it takes a long time to reverse its adverse impact. Moreover, the problems of climate change cannot be resolved by the actions of few countries. In this regard, India has made significant progress in many areas, such as playing a leading role by committing at international level for decarbonization of its economy by transitioning from fossil fuels based economy towards green economy and promotes its industrial, domestic, commercial sector for becoming energy efficient to achieve environmental sustainability. However, India also faces many challenges and gaps in achieving the SDGs, such as addressing the impacts of climate change on health and livelihoods, ensuring food and nutrition security for its large and diverse population, managing the growing problem of hazardous waste and pollution, promoting gender equality and women empowerment, conserving its rich biodiversity and ecosystem services, harnessing the potential of renewable energy and green technology, coping with the rapid urbanization and ensuring sustainable cities. This sub-theme will focus, inter alia, on the following issues:

- 1. Climate Change and India's role in international agreements, its outcomes and failures.
- 2. Climate Change and its impact on agriculture, health, livelihood and its solutions.
- 3. Health Hazard and Waste Management: Problems, Practices and Policies.
- Biodiversity Conservation and Ecosystem Services: Threats, Valuation and Restoration. 4.
- Transition towards Renewable Energy and Green Technology: Potential, Barriers and 5. Solutions.
- 6. Urbanization and Sustainable Cities: Trends, Issues and Planning.
- 7. Nutritional Security and Millets: Opportunities, Challenges and Innovations.
- 8. Poverty Eradication and Inclusive Growth: Drivers, Measures and Impacts.

Dr. Ambedkar's Perspective of Economic Development and Its Relevance for **Contemporary India**

Prof G Nancharaiah

Former Vice Chancellor Babasaheb Bhima Rao Ambedkar University (A Central University), Lucknow **Abstract**

In the context of shifting the economic policy of India from growth with Justice to economic liberalization in 1991, this lecture analyses the views of Ambedkar on various aspects of Indian Economy such as caste and its economic implications, monetary and fiscal systems, exchange rate and trade, Indian agriculture and his plan of Economic development and examines their relevance for contemporary India. Ambedkar believed that the state has to play crucial role in restructuring the Indian society and in accelerating growth with Justice under democratic polity. The foundations of democracy would be feeble and shaky if there is no social and economic democracy consistent with political democracy. He opined that caste is not merely a division of labour, it is also a division of labourers. It is hierarchical. Untouchability, which was the by-product of caste system, was not only a form of social discrimination but also a source of economic exploitation.

Ambedkar opines that the fiscal policy of government would be sound when the tax policy is not only elastic but also just. Government must control its unproductive expenditure while expending more on progressive works like roads, irrigation, education etc. According to Ambedkar fall in the exchange rate, that is currency depreciation leads to raise in prices causing redistribution of income in favor of business class at the cost of working class whose wages will not raise in proportion to price raise. Hence Ambedkar opposed the devaluation as a measure of improving the balance of trade.

According to Ambedkar the remedy to small holdings is to shift the idle labour to nonagricultural channels of production where it can be productively used. Industrialization of India is the soundest remedy for agricultural problems. Ambedkar in his plan of development proposed collectivization of agriculture and modified form of state socialism in the field of Industry. Given the stage and structure of Indian economy Ambedkar's perspective of development is relevant.















Prospects of Manufacturing and Service Sector Growth in India Shiladitya Chatterjee

Abstract

Though the rapid growth of the industrial sector and manufacturing in particular is crucial for India's future growth prospects, the sector's performance has been disappointing. While several factors are holding back progress of industry and manufacturing, a key structural impediment is the sector's unbalanced development structure evident in the preponderance of MSMEs in output and employment with their specific problems and constraints; and the uneven spatial spread of industrial and manufacturing growth across the country. In addition, there are several other common problems confronting all industrial enterprises. The main results from a pooled crosssection and time series analysis done by the author throws some light on the relative importance of these factors. The extent that these can be tackled will determine the future growth prospects of the sector. The responsibility for addressing these problems lies crucially with both the states and the Central government; and in this respect cooperative federalism and not disharmonious relations between the Centre and state is essential for this joint effort to succeed.

India's services sector has also displayed extreme non-inclusive growth. Although services are the fastest growing sector, its growth is narrowly confined to ICT and a few other subsectors which together employ less than 10 percent of all workers, but generate about 40 percent of the output of the sector. The productivity of workers in these subsectors is many multiples of those in other subsectors. Also, apart from these modern and rapidly growing sub-sectors, employment in services is predominantly undertaken by informal workers who work in extremely poor conditions - paid low wages and irregularly, enjoy no benefits, have no fixed terms, and work often in unsafe and hazardous conditions. The future prospects of growth in services depends on the extent to which growth can be more evenly spread across all its subsectors and the challenges of transitioning informal sector workers into the formal sector can be overcome.















Exploring Nature & Drivers of Economic Growth in Uttar Pradesh: Transitioning from BIMARU to Sarvottam -Viksit Pradesh by 2047 K. V. Raju and Shivakar Tiwari

Abstract

Embarking on the path of developed Uttar Pradesh, pushing up the trajectory of economic growth is a necessary condition. The historical experience with this is abysmal. Despite the fact of being populous state in India with diverse agroclimatic condition, wide tract of fertile land, educated skilled workforce and tourism destinations, the state is unfortunately lagging much behind the other states in realising its economic potential. To understand the way to the developed state the period can be divided into two phases: Functional (2017-18 to 2029-30) and Futuristic Phase (2030-31 to 2046-47). Action cannot be delayed and thus concerted effort by GoUP has started since 2017 on both the front, streamlining, designing & implementing policy as well as rationalisation of public expenditure towards infrastructure development, the result of which is visible in recent economic outcome indicators like improving investment ecosystem. The policy actions during the functional phase will lead to distinct nature of growth in the futuristic phase.















Curricular Transformation: Implementation Challenges of NEP 2020

Prof. Sudhanshu Bhushan

Abstract

The higher education institutions in India are witnessing the challenge of introducing a multidisciplinary four-year undergraduate program (FYUP), as announced in NEP, and later codified through the (UGCF, 2022). The author has deliberated with the members of Boards of Studies, Deans, and Heads across several universities in different states over the implementation of the UGCF, 2022. The author has come across several theoretical and practical challenges associated with the implementation of a multidisciplinary Four-Year Undergraduate Program (FYUP) as per UGCF, 2022. The theoretical issues relate to the barriers to the growth and diversification of knowledge through the curricular structure imposed from above by UGC, on the one hand, and compromise over some of the basic principles in the determination of curricula, namely, the freedom of the Boards of Studies in designing curricula and allowing the diversity in the structure and content of curricula. The practical problems, too, are manifold. HEIs are finding it difficult to implement, given the shortage of teachers, and infrastructure. They find it difficult to teach common courses, consisting of value-added, multidisciplinary, ability, and skill enhancement courses. They point to the irrelevance and impracticality of open electives of minor courses. They express the view that the addition of a research component in the fourth year is difficult to implement for the want of qualified teachers. Besides, there is confusion over the issue of multiple entry and exit at the end of every year in the Four-Year Undergraduate Program (FYUP). They have also noted that there is instruction issued from the top authority. Faculty feel a sense of compulsion in the implementation of the NEP-determined curricular structure, imposed by UGCF, 2022. They have expressed the opinion that there is no freedom left at the level of Boards of Studies. They simply need to carry out the orders. There has developed a chaotic scenario at the ground level and ultimately students suffer in the teachinglearning process.















Prospects of One Trillion-Dollar Economy of Uttar Pradesh **Prof Yashvir Tyagi**

Former Head, Department of Economic University of Lucknow, Lucknow

Uttar Pradesh is the most populous state and the third largest state economy in India. However, it has not been able to harness its full potential of development. Its record of growth and development over the last seventy-five years has been a mixed one.

But now the state government has decided to change the situation with a big investment push. UP has already undertaken huge investment in infrastructure and other sectors. The state government has also succeeded in improving the 'brand U.P.'

Investors Summit (2018) and Global Investors Summit (2023) evoked very good response from domestic and foreign investors. Region-wise and sector-wise investment plans have been prepared and are being rolled out.

All this is being done with an overarching goal of making UP a trillion-dollar economy within a span of five years i.e., by the year 2027-28.

How feasible is this target? Does this put UP on the threshold of a big leap forward in its development trajectory? These questions need to be examined closely to identify the challenges and the opportunities associated with them.

The first thing is to clearly understand the implications of the challenging target of 1 trillion-dollar economy. An important aspect is that the target is in terms of dollars and whereas the GSDP (Gross State Domestic Product) is measured in Rupees and hence is to be converted into dollars. For this reason, rupee-dollar exchange rate becomes an important parameter in this exercise. The last thing to understand is that it is the nominal value of GSDP (at current prices) which is to be increased to one trillion-dollar by the target date.

Given the target of a trillion-dollar economy, we can work out the required growth rate of GSDP. In the year 2022-23, the GSDP of UP was estimated to be Rs 22.58Lakh crore or \$280.85 billion. If this is to be raised to one trillion-dollar, the GSDP should increase at a CAGR of 28.91 % in dollar terms. In rupee terms required growth rate would be higher because of likely depreciation of rupee against dollar in future.

A more realistic scenario may be that GSDP grows at a steady growth rate of 12-15% per annum. In that case, by the year 2027-28, the size of GSDP would be around \$500 billion. If this level of growth rate is maintained, UP may achieve its cherished goal of a trillion-dollar economy in about a decade from now. The objective of making U.P. a trillion-dollar economy is more of an aspirational goal than a realistic target to be achieved in the time frame of five years However, this has a great motivational value. It has galvanised the state government to make sincere and continuous efforts to accelerate the pace of development. The appropriate paradigm should be 'Sustainable Human Development.'

It is suggested that the state government formulates a long-term perspective plan of fifteen-twenty years' duration with clear cut priorities; sector, regional and agro-climatic zonal sub-plans, with a stable policy regime. A blue print for a' Viksit Uttar Pradesh @ 1947' should also be prepared. Let all the stake holders in the state work sincerely for making UP a progressive, vibrant and a developed economy.















Growing Trends in Double Engine Economy of Uttar Pradesh: An Analytical Study" Prof. Vinod Kumar Srivastava

Abstract

An economy can achieve a higher level of socio-economic development by providing impetus to investments. It is one of the basic fundaments of an economy. Uttar Pradesh is the largest populated state in India with high population density. The public sector being at the core of the State economy can play a vital role in its development. Presently the State enjoys the benefit of being blessed by the double engine governments that is, well performing government of the same national party at the Centre and the State. Consequently, Uttar Pradesh economy has grown to the status of the second largest economy of India. Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath Ji has set an ambitious target of bringing the state economy to the level of USD 1 trillion by 2027–2028. This paper analyzes the economic and social factor of Uttar Pradesh, examines the obstacles and explores the possible policy initiatives for the development of the State. Analysis of the available data reveals that the IT sector of the State needs an integrated approach for its accelerated pace development. Development of Renewable Energy in India Prof. Sanatan Nayak

Abstract

Development for a robust renewable energy sector primarily benefits for rapid economic development, improve access to energy and security, and mitigate climate change. In recent years, India has been significantly transitioning its energy consumption pattern from conventional fossil fuels to green energy and technology to achieve mitigating climate change target of containing 1.5°C, net zero emission by 2070 and cost effective energy use. This paper highlights extent and dimensions of renewable energy and technologies adopted across states in India in recent years. Further, the study aims to assess the changing nature of financing by various institutions towards renewable energy and possible challenges for financing of renewable energy. Secondary level data are collected from various Ministries of Central Government sources, reports and articles from International and National level. Our analysis of data confirm, (a) the share of renewable energy is increasing rapidly in recent years largely due to increase in the generation of solar and wind energy, (b) the weighted average of pollution rate of fossil fuels (coal, lignite, natural gas, diesel) is declining, (c) the average of pollution rate of coal is declining but higher than weighted average of other fossil fuels, (d) the investment pattern for financing the conventional energy has been declining. Our recommendations are on both short and long run for improvement in terms of developing awareness in demand for transitioning towards renewable energy, public sector needs to take a lead role in creating substantial supply of green energy, technology, allocation of enough finance towards climate control agenda, establishing subsidiary institutions, creating enough provision for e-waste management and creation for efficient circular economy.

Unlocking Climate finance for urban sustainability solutions Dr. Anamika Choudhary

ABSTRACT

Indian cities are important sources of economic growth, but they also have to deal with challenging

environmental problems, deteriorating infrastructure, and the threat of climate change. Currently, one-third of India's population resides in cities, which account for 63% of the GDP of the nation. Based on current trends, 590 million more people are anticipated to live in India's cities by 2030, accounting for 75% of the nation's GDP. Cities must therefore take proactive steps to improve their ability to flourish and adapt to a changing environment. The Indian Ministry of Health and Family Welfare projected in 2020 that by 2036, there will be about 600 million people living in urban areas, or about 40% of the nation's total population. Because of the shifting climate, many urban areas are suffering from extreme heat stress and water scarcity. Forty-three Indian cities lead the list of 100 cities worldwide for environmental and climate-related disasters, followed closely by Jakarta, Delhi, and Chennai. The Country is ranked seventh out of 181 in terms of exposure to and vulnerability to the effects of climate change. Studies have shown a positive correlation between urbanization and the spread of virus because of factors such as high population density,

Food insecurity and unemployment were experienced by the urban poor in the informal sector during both the first and second waves of the pandemic, exacerbating pre-existing inequities. To meet the social and economic demands of a growing urban population, Indian governments and cities should include sustainable urban development policies and practices into their governance structures. To achieve this, it would be important to assess India's readiness to face the difficult and demanding challenges. The present paper studies all such aspects in a formalized manner.
