


About Gorakhour

Scaling up operations can lead to economies of scale, facilitating access to larger markets and generating employment opportunities both on and off farms. However, achieving these benefits requires strong institutional support from cooperatives, farmer producer organizations, and self-help groups.

Sustainability of Agriculture

Ensuring the sustainability of agricultural practices is crucial in the context of climate change and environmental preservation.
